Attendance

I am sure you are aware that attendance in schools has been a national concern since the pandemic and we are no exception. attendance is vitally important to children's education and well being. The government sets a target of 96% attendance over the course of a year and schools have a duty to report on any pupil whose attendance falls below 90%. Research shows that attendance below 96% can result in children not achieving their full potential. All lessons are sequential and build on from each other, from one day to the next therefore, if children miss a lesson, they have to work harder to catch up the following day. In KS1, children learn a new phonic sound everyday so even missing 1 day puts them behind their peers. Friendships also move on when children are absent which may lead to feelings of Of course we understand that sometimes children are poorly and the best place for them to be is at home however, sometimes a dose of Calpol is enough to get them through the day. We will be sending your child's attendance certificate home next week for your information. If you have any concerns about your child's attendance please see Mrs Mignaud.
